	s year deliver your Jlum intent?	Studies in Year 7 will give students an overview of how their country has changed and developed over time. Specifically they will gain an understanding of the complexities of life in Britain from the medieval period to the end of the 17th century whilst familiarising themselves with the key historical concepts such as continuity and change, cause and consequence, similarity, difference and significance. They will gain knowledge of key events and how they have shaped our country and beyond, including the introduction and collapse of the Feudal System and the growth of parliament.			What does the end of year assessment look like?	At the end of Year 7, students will complete an unaided 60 minute assessment, which will assess the application of their substantive and disciplinary knowledge gained over the course of the year. The assessment will feature a combination of source questions, interpretations analysis, and descibe/account questions for students to demonstrate their understanding of causation as a second-order concept in History. This will be assessed by class teachers using SPA sheets adapted from AQA mark schemes, and standardised through in-department moderation.
